- More than 40% of farmland nationwide is leased
- Conservation practices are less prevalent on leased acres
- Complex problem with similar causes nationwide

Value of Conservation Practices

- Practices can lead to improved:
 - -soil health;
 - -water quality; and
 - -farm property value
- In the Chesapeake Bay watershed nutrient reduction is needed.



Leasing as a tool

- Think of a lease as a tool
- Start with communication
- Consensus on conservation goals/priorities
- A Conservation Plan can start the process





Structuring a Lease for Conservation

- Lease Options:
 - Think beyond cash rent
 Crop share/Flexible
 - Term matters
 - Rent should reflect investment and impact on yield
 - Share in the cost-share love








Specific Practice Provisions

Sample riparian buffer provision:

• Tenant shall maintain the vegetative buffer, in accordance with SCD and NRCS standards, by mowing and/ or applying recommended herbicides to control noxious weeds and/or invasive species.
